

Methodology

Overview

This form is designed to collect data from **Key Informants (KIs)** (community leaders, sector experts, etc.), at the community/village level, who know about the situation of the community. **Please** ensure the number of female and male key informants and enumerators are as equal as possible so that needs and concerns of all segments of society are expressed and taken into account.

Gathering Information

- Interview key informants about information on IDPs (including new arrivals) at the sub-district level/community
- Interview key informant on the situation of the resident population host community and returnees, concerning basic services, water electricity, solid waste management, energy, local enterprises, debris.
- Key informants are **people with specific knowledge about certain aspects** of the community, the site visited, the population, or the emergency, either because of their professional background, leadership responsibilities, or particular personal experience.
- Key informants are **those with the most reliable and complete information**, taking into account the political dimension of the crisis and potential biases.
- Typical key informants for humanitarian assessments in Syria are representatives of affected population groups, local administrative councils, activist's groups, census offices, camp managers, documentation offices, local relief committees, local NGOs, INGOs, UN agencies, charities, the municipality, or other community leaders, representatives of the business community, traders, farmers. Others can be selected on the enumerator's judgement.
- Information can be cross-checked through direct observation of the situation, opinions from the general population, and so on.
- Some questions include a confidence level, for the enumerator to rate how confident they are that the information is credible.

Safety

- **At no time should names be recorded**
- It is not recommended to collect and carry hard copies of responses if possible.
- Do not carry a list of key informants.
- Recording evidence that can confirm the credibility of information can be useful (for example taking photos of a damaged hospital, maps, stagnant water, empty markets), but enumerators will have to use their judgement as to whether this is safe.
- Do not prompt information about specific GBV and Child protection cases
- If a protection specific case (GBV or Child Protection) is disclosed, contact the protection focal point in your area and without disclosing identifiable information, ask for direction.

Guidelines

- Introduce yourself; be clear on the purpose of the assessment.
- Ensure they understand this is not a promise for services but will help us plan our response.
- Ensure that the person interviewed is giving their **informed consent** (they understand what the assessment is for and voluntarily wish to participate).
- Tell them that they may skip any questions they do not want to answer, either because they are not comfortable answering them, they do not have the expertise, or they do not know the answer.
